



Groups

Organized groups of 25 or more may purchase discounted admission to the Fair for Fri., Sat. or Sun. Tickets must be purchased prior to Tues., Sept. 16. For school groups, contact Karin Thody by phone (860-349-9191) or email: secretary@durhamfair.com. For nonprofit or corporate groups, call Carol Schilling (860-807-5656). The Association reserves the right to determine which groups qualify for this arrangement and to determine the number of chaperones the group must provide.

Parking

There is a \$5 per car charge for all vehicles parking in specified Durham Fair parking lots. There is no charge for vendor and volunteer parking in the designated parking lot with an issued pass. Shuttle bus service to the fairgrounds from all outlying parking lots is provided. Police protection will be provided, but the Association is not responsible for vehicles or personal property left in or on vehicles.

A limited number of 4-day parking lot passes will be available for \$10 in advance only. The pass will allow unlimited access to the specified lots for the Fair hours. The pass must be displayed in the windshield of the car.

Handicapped Parking

Handicapped parking (state permit required) is available at the District 13 school grounds off State Route 17. Watch for signage with location details. Special buses designed for use by handicapped persons will bring persons from that lot to the fairgrounds.

Date

Because of our concern for the safety of the animals on exhibit and for the comfort and safety of our fairgoers, no pets are allowed on the fairgrounds. The only exception is a service animal trained to provide assistance to an individual with a disability, and appropriate paperwork must accompany the service animal.

Alcoholic Beverages and Weapons

We are proud of our reputation as a family-friendly event. We intend to maintain that reputation. Therefore, no alcoholic beverages or weapons are to be brought on to any Durham Fair property, including parking lots. People and packages will be subject to search by security personnel. Anyone in violation of this rule will be subject to arrest and removal from the Durham Fair property. Exhibitors will forfeit all prizes including trophies, ribbons, and premium money. Concessionaires will forfeit the privilege of doing business at the Durham Fair.

Lost Children

Name tags for small children are available at each Fair Information Booth. Parents or guardians are urged to make use of the name tags. Parents or guardians should instruct their children where to wait if they become lost and to write that location on the child's name tag. Lost children who have not been given instructions will be taken to the State Police Command Post.

First Aic

First aid is provided at several locations throughout the fairgrounds. If you are in need of medical attention, please follow the first aid arrows on the signs posted throughout the fair grounds.

Use of the Durham Fair Name, Logo and Slogans

The use, for any purpose or in any way, of the name Durham Fair, the Durham Fair logo or Durham Fair slogans is strictly prohibited without a written agreement authorized by either the Executive Committee or the Board of Directors of the Association and signed by the Association President or Vice Presidents.

All requests for permission to use the Association's name, logo and slogans must be received by the Association's Secretary or President not less than 60 days before the proposed use is to begin.

Commercial Endorsements

The Association does not endorse any commercial product, service or enterprise. Exceptions to this rule can be authorized only by the Executive Committee or the Board of Directors. Acceptance of a donation by the Association does not constitute endorsement of the donor's product, service, philosophy or organization.

Booth Rule

No product, service, philosophy or organization can be sold, advertised or in any other way promoted on the fairgrounds during the Fair except from within space contracted for with the appropriate superintendent. Acceptance of any donation by the Association does not entitle the donor to be exempt from this rule. The Association's Executive Committee is authorized to determine the appropriate public acknowledgment of any donation accepted.

Exhibitor's Information

General

All animals and articles exhibited at the Fair must be the property of the exhibitor. All flowers, fruits and vegetables must have been grown by the exhibitor during the 2014 season. All handcrafted items must be the work of the exhibitor. All exhibits will be accepted subject to the laws of the State of Connecticut and the rules and regulations established for each department of the Fair, as stated under each department's description in this Exhibitor's Guide, as well as in the rules outlined here. Any premium earned for any exhibit at the Fair will be forfeited if the exhibitor fails to abide by any of the rules and conditions outlined here, elsewhere in the Exhibitor's Guide and/or on the exhibit entry form.

Entries

All exhibits are for the sole benefit of the exhibitor. The exhibitor agrees that the monetary amount of the exhibit is limited, and there will be no consequential damages from the exhibit's damage, destruction or loss.

By submitting an exhibit to the Fair, the exhibitor hereby releases and agrees to hold harmless the Fair from any and all liability arising out of the exhibitor's acts or omissions of the exhibitor, and the exhibitor agrees that the exhibit is exhibited at the owner's risk. The Fair assumes no responsibility for any loss, injury or damage. The exhibitor also recognizes that the exhibit will be exposed to public display and, in some cases, contact. The Fair has the right to make decisions about position and location of an exhibit, including the right to move it, and this will also be at the sole risk of the exhibitor. This includes any transportation, loading or other physical manipulation of an exhibit by Fair personnel, which is performed as an accommodation to the exhibitor.

The Fair has the authority to refuse any exhibit it considers to be inappropriate to its reputation or image, and this includes the right to ask the exhibitor to remove the exhibit. Any items, actions or activities that are deemed by the Fair to be a threat to the safety of Fair patrons (weapons, offensive, material, etc.) cannot be displayed on the fairgrounds and will be removed from the fairgrounds.

In order to exhibit at the Fair, please complete and submit the appropriate entry form or forms found at the back of this book (entry forms may be copied, if necessary). Each form includes instructions about required information, as well as the deadline for form submission and when the exhibit itself must be brought to the fairgrounds. That information is also included in the front of this Exhibitor's Guide. (NOTE: Certain departments may require a social security number or federal identification number. The Fair reserves the right to withhold payment of premiums until receipt of all necessary and required information.)

No one, including exhibitors, will be allowed to enter the fair-grounds during the operating hours of the Fair for any reason, including the feeding of animals, without a valid admission ticket. As stated previously, a special, reduced-rate four-day pass is available only to exhibitors.

Premium Checks

Premium checks must be cashed no later than April 1, 2015. Any checks not cashed at that time will be considered a donation to the Fair.

Judging

No person will be allowed to interfere with the judging process. The exhibit of any person so interfering will be excluded from competition. Where there is no competition in a class, each animal or article will be judged and placed according to its merits.

Removal of Personal Skills and Plant Science Exhibits

Exhibits in the Personal Skills Department and Plant Science Department must be on the fairgrounds all four days of the Fair in order to be eligible for premium money. Premiums and awards will be forfeited (in total) for the exhibitor who removes any exhibits, unless otherwise stated, from the allotted space before 7 p.m. on Sun., Sept. 28. We cannot allow vehicles to enter any part of the fairgrounds where crowds of people are present; therefore, no vehicles should plan to enter the fairgrounds before 8 p.m. on Sun., Sept. 28. The Fair may dispose of any exhibit not promptly claimed by an exhibitor after processing, or if an exhibitor fails to promptly remove a rejected exhibit.

Removal of Livestock Exhibits

No animals will be dismissed before 6 p.m. on Sun., Sept. 28. Premiums and awards will be forfeited (in total) for the exhibitor who removes any animals before 6 p.m. on this day. No trailers will be permitted in front of the barns for loading of exhibits. Exhibitors will be allowed entrance on a rotational basis after 6:45 p.m. Release times subject to Public Safety permission.

Vehicles on the Fairgrounds During Fairtime.

No vehicle will be allowed to drive on the fairgrounds after 8 a.m. each day of the Fair. All vehicles must be removed from the fairgrounds to the proper parking lot by that time each morning. Any supplies not brought in by that time must be carried in from the parking lot. Vehicles will not be allowed on the fairgrounds before 8 p.m. on Sunday, September 28.

People's Choice Award

(Some departments)

Rosette Ribbon

This award will be determined by fairgoers via a ballot process. Ballots will be tallied at the end of the day on Sun., Sept. 28. If the superintendent sees evidence that the ballot box was tampered with, those ballots will be removed and then the ballots will be tallied.

LIVESTOCK

2014 State of Connecticut Fair and Show Requirements

A. General Requirements

- Health certificates signed by an accredited veterinarian and other required testing will be valid for the entire 2014 show season.
- All animals and poultry entered at fairs and shows must be in good health and in proper physical condition and will be examined at the exhibition by the barn superintendent. Evidence of poor condition or infectious or contagious disease or failure to produce the necessary documents for health certification, vaccination or testing will result in ejection. The Connecticut Dept. of Agriculture Livestock Inspector's decision is final.
- Health charts and proof of vaccination where applicable are the responsibility of the exhibitor.
- 4. Each barn superintendent will collect and hold the health certificates from each exhibitor. Animals not in compliance with the State regulations for shows and fairs will not be allowed. A complete list, containing the name of the exhibitor, address, animal ID (ear tag, tattoo, leg band), breed and age of each animal, and the total head count will be made available to the State Livestock Inspector and forwarded to the Connecticut Dept. of Agriculture, Bureau of Regulation & Inspection, by the fair superintendent. All animals and poultry present on the grounds should be identified on this list. Any animal that is rejected should be noted as such with a brief statement of reason. Rejected animals or poultry should be removed from the grounds as soon as possible. Any concerns about the health of any animal or bird should be reported to the State Livestock Inspector or the fair veterinarian immediately.
- 5. Isolate all exhibited animals and poultry upon their return to the farm from other animals and poultry for 3-4 weeks to reduce the risk of disease exposure and transmission. Call your local veterinarian if your animals or poultry become sick to help you with diagnosis and treatment.
- 6. Contact the Bureau of Regulation and Inspection at 860-713-2504 if you have any questions.

B. Connecticut Animals

All cattle, horses and sheep shall have a rabies vaccination given by a licensed veterinarian. The vaccination certificate must be signed by the veterinarian that gave the vaccination and include the animal's identification and description, the name of the vaccine's manufacturer, serial number and the date the vaccination was given and when it expires. If it is the animal's first rabies vaccination, it must be given at least 30 days prior to their first show date to be considered current.

- 1. All Species: Animals must originate from herds or flocks that meet the testing and health requirements of the State of Connecticut. State livestock inspectors may request proof of compliance with State requirements. No herd or flock under quarantine order shall move or be exhibited. All animals must have permanent identification (ear tag, tattoo, leg band, microchip plus a reader or EIA certificate).
- **2. Cattle:** All cattle must have a health certificate issued within 60 days of their first show by an accredited veterinarian stating that the animal is in good health and not showing signs of infectious, contagious and/or communicable diseases.
- 3. Horses: All horses must have a negative AGID (Coggins) or ELISA test for Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) within 12 months of their show date and be accompanied by this certificate. It is highly recommended that horses be vaccinated against EEE & WNV within 6 months of their first show date.

- **4. Sheep:** All sheep must have official USDA-approved identification and be accompanied by health certificates issued within 60 days of their first show by an accredited veterinarian stating that the sheep are in good health and not showing signs of infectious, contagious and/or communicable diseases and are not from Scrapie-exposed flocks.
- **5. Goats:** All goats must have official USDA-approved identification and a health certificate issued within 60 days of their first show by an accredited veterinarian stating that the animals are in good health and not showing signs of infectious, contagious and/or communicable diseases and not from Scrapie-exposed herds.
- 6. Swine: All swine must originate from Connecticut herds that are tested for Brucellosis and Pseudorabies on a yearly basis. All swine must have a health certificate issued within 60 days prior to the first show by an accredited veterinarian. If the swine are purchased from a tested herd, a bill of sale from the Connecticut producer must be presented to the State veterinarian's office before a Connecticut Exhibition Test card will be issued to the new owner.
- healthy flocks with no evidence of infectious, contagious and/or communicable diseases. All birds must be inspected, identified and be accompanied by written proof (Connecticut Flock Test card or Connecticut Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory Report) that verifies that the breeding flock or the individual birds listed on the report were blood-test negative for Salmonella pullorum within 365 days of the show date. Concurrent Avian Influenza testing of the flock and/or individual birds is strongly recommended. Poultry vaccinated within 30 days with any live virus vaccine will be prohibited from showing. All cages, crates or vehicles used for housing or transporting poultry must be cleaned and disinfected before and after each show. Doves, pigeons and waterfowl are exempt from testing requirements, but must be identified by leg bands or wing tags.
- 8. Llamas & Alpacas: Llamas and alpacas that originate within the State must have a health certificate issued within 30 days of the first show by an accredited veterinarian listing the permanent identification (ear tag, tattoo or microchip and a reader must be available for the microchip) and stating the animal is in good health and free of obvious signs of infectious disease.

C. Out of State Animals

All cattle, horses and sheep shall have a rabies vaccination given by a licensed veterinarian. The vaccination certificate must be signed by the veterinarian that gave the vaccination and include the animal's identification and description, the name of the vaccine's manufacturer, serial number and the date the vaccination was given and when it expires. If it is the animal's first rabies vaccination, it must be given at least 30 days prior to their first show date.

1. All Species: Animals shall originate from herds or flocks that meet the testing and health requirements of the State of Connecticut and must be accompanied by health certificates and test charts as indicated below. No animals from a herd or flock under quarantine order shall enter into the State. All animals and poultry must have official permanent identification (ear tag, tattoo, leg band, wing band, microchip plus a reader, or EIA certificate). All animals and birds (except horses) must have an exhibition permit number on the health certificates. Call 860-713-2504 or 860-713-2505 for a permit number. All out of state animals and birds offered for sale must meet Connecticut Importation Regulations.

- 2. Cattle: All cattle must have health certificates issued within 30 days of the first show by an accredited veterinarian, test charts and vaccination certificates where applicable. All cattle must have a negative TB test within 12 months of the show date. Cattle under 6 months of age may go on the dam's TB test chart if the dam was tested for TB within the past 12 months and a copy of the results is provided. All Brucellosis vaccinated female cattle over 18 months of age and all bulls and non-vaccinated female cattle 6 months of age and older must have a negative Brucellosis test within 12 months of the show date. Steers and spayed heifers are exempt from Brucellosis testing.
- 3. Horses: All horses must have a health certificate issued within 30 days of their first show date by an accredited veterinarian. All horses must have a negative AGID (Coggins) or ELISA test for Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) within 12 months of the show date and be accompanied by this certificate. It is highly recommended that horses be vaccinated against EEE & WNV within 6 months of the first show date.
- **4. Sheep:** All sheep must have official USDA-approved identification and be accompanied by health certificates issued within 30 days of their first show date by an accredited veterinarian stating that the sheep are in good health and not showing signs of infectious, contagious and/or communicable diseases and are not from Scrapie-exposed flocks.
- 5. Goats: All goats must have official USDA-approved identification and be accompanied by a health certificate issued within 30 days of their first show date by an accredited veterinarian stating that the goats are in good health and not showing signs of infectious, contagious and/or communicable diseases and are not from Scrapie-exposed flocks. All goats must originate from Brucellosis and TB free herds. Goats over 3 months old must test negative to TB and Brucellosis within 12 months of the show date. Kids under 3 months of age may go on the dam's test chart if the dam was tested within the past 12 months and a copy of the results is provided. Wethers are exempt from Brucellosis testing.
- 6. Swine: Swine that are 3 months of age and older must be negative to Brucellosis and Pseudorabies tests and have a health certificate stating such within 30 days of their first show date by an accredited veterinarian. Barrows are exempt from Brucellosis testing but must have a negative Pseudorabies test. Swine under 3 months of age must originate from a Brucellosis-free and Pseudorabies qualified herd and the herd test dates and qualified herd numbers must be on the health certificate.
- 7. Poultry: All poultry must be identified and test negative for Salmonella pullorum within 12 months of the show date and be accompanied by this certificate. All poultry must comply with the Department of Agriculture Avian Influenza requirements by originating from Al-Free flocks or be tested for Al within 30 days of entry and have a certificate. No poultry from any areas of any state having Avian Influenza may enter Connecticut. Poultry vaccinated within 30 days with any live virus vaccine will be prohibited from showing. All cages, crates and vehicles used for housing and transporting poultry must be cleaned and disinfected before and after each show. Doves, pigeons and waterfowl are exempt from testing requirements, but must be identified by leg bands or wing tags.
- 8. Llamas & Alpacas: All llamas and alpacas must have a negative Axillary TB test within 12 months and a negative Brucellosis test within 12 months of entry and a health certificate issued within 30 days of the first show by an accredited veterinarian, listing the permanent identification (ear tag, tattoo or microchip and a reader must be available for the microchip) and test results.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

***All animals for which there is a licensed Rabies vaccine – cattle, horses, sheep, dogs, cats and ferrets – exposed to the public shall be vaccinated against Rabies. Animals not having an approved Rabies vaccination shall be displayed in a manner such that the public would not be in contact or exposed to saliva from those animals and have EASILY VISIBLE POSTED SIGNS OR TAPE stating, "CONNECTICUT RABIES ADVISORY NOTICE - DO NOT FEED OR TOUCH ANIMALS."

On August 4, 2009, the Department of Agriculture adopted regulations for the "Control of Rabies in Public Settings" which will be enforced at all Connecticut fairs and public exhibitions. The complete text of the regulations, RCSA §§ 22-359-1 through 22-359-5, follows this notice.

Its provisions include the following for both Connecticut and out of state animals:

- (1) Animals for which there is a licensed Rabies vaccine
 - Horses, cattle, sheep, dogs and cats must be currently vaccinated against rabies by a licensed veterinarian unless they are under the minimum age to be vaccinated. (Ferrets are also included in this category if displayed.)
 - These animals must have a rabies vaccination certificate signed by the licensed veterinarian administering the vaccine that includes the animal's identification and description, name and address of owner, name of the vaccine's manufacturer, serial number, date the vaccination was administered and date when it expires.
 - If it is the animal's first vaccination, it must be given at least 30 days prior to the first show date to be considered current.
- (2) Animals not having an approved Rabies vaccination
 - Includes animals for which there is not a licensed rabies vaccine and animals for which there is a licensed rabies vaccine but are under the age to be vaccinated. (Most rabies vaccines are labeled to be administered when animals reach 3 months of age young animals for exhibition should be vaccinated as soon as possible after 3 months of age.)
 - Animals must be separated from the public by sufficient means to avoid direct contact with people and other animals, such as a double fence, plexiglass, or other means; or conspicuous signs or tape must be posted near the animal enclosure stating "CONNECTICUT RABIES ADVISORY NOTICE – DO NOT FEED OR TOUCH ANIMALS".

Yellow tape with the rabies advisory notice wording is available for purchase from the Department of Agriculture.

Regulations of Connecticut State Agencies Control of Rabies in Public Settings

Section 22-359-1 Definitions.

As used in Sections 22-359-1 to 22-359-5, inclusive, of the Regulations of Connecticut State Agencies:

- (1) "Animal" means any warm blooded creatures, including bats.
- (2) "Commissioner" means the Commissioner of Agriculture or the Commissioner's designated agent.
- (3) "Controlled situation" means a public setting in which an animal is under the control of a handler and persons having direct physical contact with such animal can be readily identified and contacted if a rabies exposure incident occurs.
- (4) "Currently vaccinated" means an animal was vaccinated against rabies and is considered immunized based on administration of the primary vaccination at least 30 days previously or immediately after a booster vaccination and vaccinations have been administered in accordance with licensed rabies vaccine label directions.

- (5) "Licensed rabies vaccine" means a vaccine against rabies for certain species of animals licensed by the United States Department of Agriculture for use in such species and marketed in the United States.
- (6) "Not currently vaccinated" means an animal for which there is no licensed rabies vaccine or an animal for which there is a licensed rabies vaccine but such animal is under the minimum age to be vaccinated against rabies or does not satisfy the requirements of "currently vaccinated" as defined in subdivision (4) of this section.
- (7) "Public setting" means any event, facility or premise at which the public is invited and allowed to have direct physical contact with animals. Public settings include but are not limited to fairs, animal exhibitions, petting zoos, municipal pounds, animal shelters, nature centers, riding stables, pony rides, and educational programs.
- (8) "Rabies" means an infection of the central nervous system of mammals caused by viruses in the Rhabdovirus family that typically results in death.
- (9) "Uncontrolled situation" means a public setting at which persons have direct physical contact with an animal and such persons cannot be readily identified or contacted if a rabies exposure incident occurs.
- (10) "Vaccinated" means an animal was vaccinated against rabies in accordance with licensed rabies vaccine label directions.

 Section 22-359-2. Animals for which there is a licensed rabies vaccine.

 Exceptions.
- No animal for which there is a licensed rabies vaccine may be in a public setting without being currently vaccinated for rabies.
- (2) Animals under the minimum age to be vaccinated, vaccinated animals offered for sale or adoption and animals residing in municipal pounds shall be exempt from the provisions of this section.

Section 22-359-3. Animals not currently vaccinated.

- (1) Written records shall be kept by the owner, keeper, or handler of any animal not currently vaccinated for rabies that is present in a public setting in a controlled situation. The written records shall include contact information for all persons having direct physical contact with such animal, including the names, addresses and telephone numbers of such persons and the date of contact. Such records shall be maintained for a period of six months and shall be made immediately available to the Commissioner upon request.
- (2) Any animal not currently vaccinated for rabies that is present in a public setting in an uncontrolled situation shall be separated from the public by sufficient means to avoid direct contact between people and animals, such as a double fence, plexiglass, or other device to avoid direct contact between people and animals as determined by the Commissioner, or a conspicuous sign shall be posted near the animal enclosure stating "CONNECTICUT RABIES ADVISORY NOTICE – DO NOT FEED OR TOUCH ANIMALS".
- Section 22-359-4. Exemptions.
- (1) Mice, rats, gerbils, hamsters, guinea pigs, and rabbits and any other animal in a public setting considered low risk for rabies transmission by the Commissioner which can be documented as being born and exclusively raised and kept in a manner that prohibits direct physical contact with wildlife are exempt from the provisions of sections 22-359-2 and 22-359-3 of the Regulations of Connecticut State Agencies.
- (2) Birds, reptiles and amphibians shall be exempt from the provisions of sections 22-359-2 and 22-359-3 of the Regulations of Connecticut State Agencies.
- (3) Animals which were bred at facilities licensed by the United States Department of Agriculture, and which can be documented as being born and exclusively raised and kept in a

manner that prohibits direct physical contact with wildlife, and have at no time been co-mingled with animals that may have had direct physical contact with wildlife, are exempt from the provisions of sections 22-359-2 and 22-359-3 of the Regulations of Connecticut State Agencies.

Section 22-359-5. Penalty.

The Commissioner may impose civil penalties for any violation of the provisions of sections 22-359-2 and 22-359-3 of the Regulations of Connecticut State Agencies in accordance with the provisions of Connecticut General Statutes section 22-7. (Effective August 4, 2009)

IAFE (International Association of Fairs and Expositions) National Code of Show Ring Ethics

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standard of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. In addition to the "IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics," fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, state, provincial and national levels.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

The following is list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

- All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership and age of all animals.
 Misrepresentation of ownership, age or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
- Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.
- Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs or livestock shows.
- 4. Animals shall be presented to show events where they are will enter the food chain free of drugs. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in an event which culminates with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event.

If the laboratory report on the chemical analysis of saliva, urine, blood or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facies evidence such substance has been administered to the

animal internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood or other substance tested by the approved laboratory to which it was sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all the procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise at any hearing in regard to the matter conducted by the fair or livestock show.

At any time an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian and with full knowledge of the superintendent and coordinator.

- 5. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, confirmation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which effect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
- The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.
- 7. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.
- 8. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.
- 9. The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.
- 10. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer or absolutely responsible person to have any disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show against such individuals published in any publication of the International Association of Fair and Expositions, including fairs and xxpositions and any special notices to members.
- 11. The act of entering of an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

Adopted by Durham Agricultural Fair Association Board of Directors, Aug. 1996

Durham Agricultural Fair Association General Rules for Livestock Exhibitors

The Durham Agricultural Fair expects that all animals will be treated in a humane manner. Any exhibitor or representative of an exhibitor, who treats any animal in an inhumane manner, or in a manner which appears inhumane, will be removed from the Fairgrounds. All premiums and awards will be forfeited.

Agricultural Entry Policy

1. Entry Admittance

- (a) Only entries postmarked after July 31 and prior to Sept. 1 of the current year will be accepted. Those postmarked before July 31 and after Sept. 1 will be refused. Beef and Dairy cutoff date is Sept. 15
- (b) Only entries mailed directly to Durham Fair Association, Attn. Livestock Entries, P.O. Box 225, Durham, CT 06422 will be accepted.
- (c) Livestock exhibitors pay entry fees please see entry forms for details.
- (d) Only entries on the current year dated entry blank will be accepted.
- (e) Retainer fee is to be included on a separate check from that of the exhibitors passes. Check will be returned upon presentation on Thurs. Poultry & Rabbit—50¢ per head; Beef, Dairy, Sheep, Goats & Swine—\$5 per head; Llamas—\$20 per head.
- (f) Only entries with a signed affidavit, acknowledging and agreeing to adhere to the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics will be accepted.
- (g) A social security number or federal identification number is required for each exhibitor in competition for prize money. No entry will be accepted without that number.
- (h) Entries will not be accepted after the Sept. 1 entry deadline, Sept. 15 for dairy and beef, or when the barns are filled.
- Livestock exhibitors must include copies of their health certificates.

2. Number of Entries per Livestock Farm Unit - Farm Unit.

"Where a herd/flock is registered in the names of different family members of a family residing on one farm and where the herd/ flock is one unit," all entries may be considered as a single exhibitor. Youth exhibitors must show evidence of ownership either by registration or certified lease papers.

- (a) Dairy and Beef exhibitors: 12 animals per farming unit.
- (b) Goat exhibitors: 15 animals per farming unit.
- (c) Swine exhibitors: 30 per farming unit (sow & litter equals 1)
- (d) Poultry exhibitors: 40 per farming unit.
- (e) Rabbit exhibitors: 15 per farming unit.
- (f) Llama exhibitors: 6 per farming unit.
- (g) Sheep exhibitors: 15 per farming unit.

Within the farm units stated above, no (beef, dairy, sheep, goat or swine) exhibitor may enter more than 2 entries—per class—per breed.

- *Leased animals for youth will follow 4-H guidelines.
- **Note: Pending availability of pens/space the entry number per farming unit is at the discretion of the Superintendent.
- Selection Process of Entries: Selection will be based on (a) breed representation, (b) postmark dates of entries, (c) herdsmanship and sportsmanship, and (d) youths.
- 4. Acceptance letter: All entries will be acknowledged by the Superintendent by Sept. 15, with either an acceptance letter or apology letter stating that you have been placed on a waiting list.

5. Exhibitor Cancellation: If for some reason an exhibitor cannot attend or fulfill allocated pens/space, it is up to the exhibitor to notify the Superintendent, at which point the Superintendent will select from the waiting list. The exhibitor is not to select replacements or change pen/space assignments.

Exhibitor & Vehicle Admission Policy

General Admission: The Durham Agricultural Fair Association has no exhibit entry fees. However, no one, including exhibitors, will be allowed to enter the fairgrounds during the operating hours of the Fair for any reason including the feeding of animals, without a valid admission ticket.

Passes

CWL = Camper sticker, must be so noted on entry blank to reserve a space.

(TBD) = White's Livestock designated area for stock/feed vehicles. This parking area will be closed to vehicle traffic during set periods during the course of a day.

(TBD) = White's Farm Parking outside the gate but in the lot outside the barn area

- Beef and Dairy exhibitors: (1) one 4 day exhibitors pass per exhibitor. (1) one Feed sticker per Farming Unit. (1) one Parking sticker per farming unit.
- Goats, Llama, Sheep and Swine exhibitors: (1) one 4 day exhibitors pass per exhibitor. (1) one Feed sticker per Farming Unit. (1) one Parking sticker per farming unit.
- Poultry and Rabbit exhibitors: (1) one Parking sticker per farming unit. Tickets will be available for pick-up at time of cooping, Thursday before fair. If no animals are entered, tickets will be revoked.
- 4. Horse, Ox and Pony Pulling Exhibitors: Parking passes will be mailed to entrants from the prior 2 years. On the day of your respective pull, the following will be allowed free admittance. Oxen one driver & one chain man, Horse and Pony one driver and 2 evener tenders will be admitted.

One day and 4-day admission passes may be purchased prior to the Fair on entry blank or during the Fair at the Fair office. All parking stickers must be securely attached to the windshield of the vehicle. Unattached or taped on stickers will not be honored.

Junior Exhibitor: A youth 19 years of age as of the Fri. of the Fair. The birth date should be so noted on the entry blank.

Junior Show

Beef & Dairy: Juniors may show in both the Open and Junior show. **Goats, Poultry, Swine, Sheep:** Open and Juniors compete together but are recognized as two separate shows.

Judging/Premiums: No person will be allowed to interfere with the judging process. The exhibit of any person so interfering will be excluded from competition. Where there is no competition in a class, each exhibit will be judged and placed according to its own merit. Premiums will be paid in accordance with that placement. No exhibitor will pick up another exhibitor's birds or premiums. The judge's decision is always final. Failure to fulfill all requirements will result in loss of premiums!

Showmanship Junior

Dairy, Beef, Swine and Goat exhibitors must take part in their respective Fitting and Showmanship class in order to collect Junior premiums. In addition, a Junior must show a Junior animal in order to collect Junior premiums.

Poultry Showmanship: Each exhibitor of Poultry who chooses to participate will select one bird for the showmanship class from their birds being exhibited for poultry judging. Exhibitors will be judged

on their ability to show their bird to advantage. Exhibitors will be judged on appearance, skill and knowledge as outlined in CES Poultry Showmanship Bulletin (available on request from Superintendent). **Rabbit Showmanship:** If unsure how to show, ask your Superintendent for instructions.

Livestock Premiums

Beef: Angus, Shorthorns, Hereford, Simmental, Cross Breeds and market steers.

Dairy: Recognized breeds of the Purebred Dairy Cattle Assoc. Ayrshire, Brown Swiss, Guernsey, Holstein, Jersey, Red & White and Milking Shorthorn. Grade animals will be accepted for the Junior Show.

Goats: Alpine, LaMancha, Nubian, Saanen Toggenburg, Oberhasli, Recorded Grade. No horned animals or intact males will be allowed on the grounds.

Sheep: Any breed with 6 or more entries will show separately. Group classes limited to 1 per class. Any exhibitor entering 4 or more purebred sheep cannot enter grade sheep classes. All other breeds will compete together as 1.

Swine: All recognized breeds will show separately in brooding classes. In feeder, market and showmanship, all breeds and crossbreeds will show together.

Poultry: As listed in the "Standards of Perfection" and recognized Bantams (single specimens only [cock, hen, cockerel, pullet]). No production birds in adult family and only 1 production bird in Junior Department.

Rabbits: American Rabbit Breeders' Association (ARBA) sanctioned show and will be governed in accordance with their rules and those of the Durham Agricultural Fair Association. Pets are welcome (limit 2 per family and specify PET division on the entry).

Exhibit Area

Beef, Dairy, Goats, Llamas, Sheep and Swine: (1) Livestock exhibitors will be required to maintain their respective areas in a clean and orderly condition at all times. Dirty, sick or unruly animals will not be permitted to compete and will be sent home at the Superintendent's discretion. Failure to comply will result in a clean-up being performed by Fair personnel and cost deducted from premiums. (2) Each exhibitor shall furnish feed and hay; bedding will be provided. (3) Each exhibitor shall decorate his or her space to make the barn more appealing and educational. (4) At the close of the Fair each exhibitor is requested to move their bedding to the center aisle of the barn. (5) All **Goat, Llama, Sheep and Swine** exhibitors will take down their own pens before leaving on Sunday. (6) All animals must be washed before 9 a.m. (hoses must have shutoff nozzles). (7) All blankets must be removed from animals during Fair hours. (8) During each respective show, exhibitors are to wear show whites or respectable show attire. (9) **Goats** – Each animal should be accompanied with an 18" tie lead. (10) Goats – Must be owned or leased by June 1 unless kids are born into the herd. (11) Llamas - Exhibitors should plan on feeding before 8:30 a.m.

Poultry and Rabbit: (1) A cage deposit of 50 cents per animal will be collected and will be refunded when you bring your animals to the Fair. (2) Feed, water and bedding will be provided by the Durham Agricultural Fair Association. (3) **Rabbit** exhibitors MUST supply 2 heavy or weighted feed and water dishes. No tin cans or light plastic dishes will be accepted. (4) **Poultry** exhibitors with turkeys, geese and waterfowl must bring their own water containers.

No animals will be dismissed before 6 p.m. on Sun., Sept. 28. Premiums and awards will be forfeited (in total) for the exhibitor who removes any animals before this time. No trailers will be permitted in front of the barns for loading of exhibits.

All exhibitors will be allowed on a rotational basis after 6:45 p.m.

1¹/₂ lb Kielbasa cut in 2" pieces

1 small cabbage cut in small chunks

2 large potatoes cubed

3 carrots cut in chunks

1 green or red bell pepper large, diced

2 stalks celery 1" pieces

1 large onion large, diced

2 cloves garlic minced

3-4 tomatoes large chunks

1 tsp thyme

1/4 cup parsley chopped

2 bay leaves

Salt and pepper to taste

1/2 cup water

In a large casserole, sauté onion, garlic, peppers and celery until fragrant. Add kielbasa and sauté 5 minutes. Add remaining vegetables and herbs plus $^{1}\!/_{2}$ cup of water, mix until well combined. Cover and bake in a 375 degree oven for 45 to 60 minutes or until vegetables are tender.

All entries must be pre-registered; no walk-ins will be accepted.

See page 1 of this Guide for entry and item delivery deadlines. Online entries are preferred. To enter online, go to www.durhamfair.com. If online entry is not possible, use the Giant Pumpkins entry form on page 79 of this Guide. Fairground directions are on the Fair website.

Entry must be grown by the exhibitor, and only 1 official entry per exhibitor is allowed. Other pumpkins brought by the exhibitor will be considered as exhibition and will be officially weighed and exhibited, but not eligible for prize money or awards.

Exhibit of 100 lbs. and over is encouraged, but all are welcome. Prize money for the top 10 weights will pay out as follows, starting with first place: \$800 – \$700 – \$600 – \$400 – \$300 – \$250 – \$200 – \$150 – \$100 – \$50. Ribbons will be awarded to the top 20 entries. In order to receive prize money, your entry must remain intact and on display for the duration of the Fair (9 p.m. Wed. to 7 p.m. Sun.). Pumpkins of all colors are eligible for prize money, and ties will be broken based on appearance. If, however, the entry is deemed to be 100% gray/green in color, the entry will be titled as a squash, but will still be eligible for prize money and a ribbon as stated above, since the placing is based on weight.

All entries (unless easily moved by 2 people) must be on a pallet to facilitate the unloading process. All entries must be healthy and must be free of rot, holes/cracks that go through to the cavity, chemical or fungicide residue and serious soft spots. No previously weighed fruit may be considered as competition. All entries will be judged before being weighed in, and the judge's decision is final.

Other GPC (Great Pumpkin Commonwealth) entries will be accepted for official documentation and submission.

All exhibits should be picked up anytime during the day on Mon., Sept. 29; if needed, forklift assistance will be available from 4–7:30 p.m. If exhibits are not picked up by 7:30 p.m., and contact (a phone call) has not been made to the Superintendent, the entries become property of the Fair.

1 tsp baking soda

In a separate measuring cup, combine:

1 cup buttermilk

1 tsp vinegar

Alternately add dry ingredients and buttermilk mixture to wet ingredients.

2014 State Baking Contests

Rules of Contests

WHO MAY ENTER: The contest at each participating member fair is open to all men, women and juniors who are residents of Connecticut. Commercial, industrial or professional bakers are not eligible. Divisions: Junior (ages 7 to 15 as of July 1st) and Adult (age 15 and over).

HOW TO ENTER: Any Connecticut resident entering a contest at any member fair is automatically entered and competing in the local contest. Contestants may enter the contest at as many fairs they wish until they win first prize. They will then represent that fair at the state baking contest. Please submit entries to both the local and state contest on disposable plates. The Association of Connecticut Fairs and the local fairs are not responsible for the return of plates, trays or containers.

JUDGING: Judging will be based on appearance, flavor and texture. The Association of Connecticut Fairs will furnish judges' score sheets to each fair and the contestant will receive these sheets at the end of the contest. Additions, deletions or substitutions in the recipe are not permitted and will result in disqualification. All decisions of the judges are final.

LOCAL CONTEST: The winner of the local contest will receive a blue ribbon from the Association of Connecticut Fairs and will then become eligible to submit their entry at the state contest. In the event that only one entry is received at the local contest and that entry is worthy of first prize, that entry must be awarded the first place ribbon.

STATE CONTEST: The state contest is held as part of the Fall Meeting and Convention of the Association of Connecticut Fairs. Entries for the state contest are accepted until 11 a.m. on the day of the contest (contact your local fair or visit www.ctagfairs.org for the date and location). Contest winners are announced on the day of the contest. Each fair is responsible for contacting their contest winner and provide them with information. The Association of Connecticut Fairs does not contact individual fairs or contest winners in regards to contest and banquet reservations nor does the Association of Connecticut Fairs cover the costs of attending the awards banquet. NO BANQUET RESERVATIONS FOR CONTEST WINNERS WILL BE ACCEPTED AT THE DOOR.

2014 ADULT BAKING CONTEST Citrus Chiffon Cake with Citrus Glaze

Ingredients

7 egg whites—at room temperature

1/2 teaspoon Cream of Tartar

1/4 teaspoon salt

11/2 cup sugar—divided

21/4 cups King Arthur Flour cake flour

1 tablespoon baking powder

1/2 cup vegetable oil

¹/₂ cup orange juice

1/4 cup lemon juice

2 tablespoons orange zest

1 teaspoon lemon zest

5 egg yolks

Preheat oven to 325°

In large mixing bowl, with mixer at high speed, beat egg whites, cream of tartar and salt until soft peaks form. Beating at high speed, gradually sprinkle in 1/2 cup sugar, 2 tablespoons at a time, beating well after each addition until sugar is completely dissolved and whites stand in stiff peaks. In another large bowl, sift cake flour, 1 cup sugar

and baking powder. Add in vegetable oil, orange juice, lemon juice, orange zest, lemon zest and egg yolks. Beat until well blended and smooth, occasionally scraping bowl with rubber spatula. With rubber spatula or wire whisk, gently fold egg-yolk mixture into beaten whites. Pour batter into ungreased 9.5 or 10 inch angel food tube pan. Bake cake 1 hour or until golden and top of cake springs back when touched with fingers. Invert cake in pan on funnel; cool completely in pan. Carefully loosen cake from tube pan. Place on aluminum foil covered cardboard.

Ingredients—Citrus Glaze

1 cup confectioner's sugar

5 teaspoons orange juice

1 teaspoon orange zest

1 teaspoon lemon zest

1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract

1/8 teaspoon salt

Combine ingredients for Citrus Glaze in small mixing bowl, whisk until blended and smooth. Spread glaze on top of cake, letting some glaze run down side of cake. Submit on aluminum foil covered cardboard.

Who May Enter: This contest is open to all residents of Connecticut; men, women and juniors. If entered by juniors, they will be judged with all adult entries.

How To Enter: Any quilt that is entered at any participating fair that is a member of the Association of Connecticut Fairs is automatically competing in the local contest. Contestants may enter the contest at as many member fairs as they wish until they win first prize. They will then represent that fair in the state contest. The state contest is held at the annual Association of Connecticut Fairs Fall Meeting.

Judging: The Association of Connecticut Fairs will furnish judges score sheets to each fair. The contestants will receive these sheets at the end of the contest. Judging will be based on overall appearance, workmanship and originality. Decisions of the judges are final.

Local Contest: The winner of the quilt contest will receive a white ribbon from The Association of Connecticut Fairs and will become eligible to submit their entry to the state contest. In the event a fair receives only one entry in the contest and that entry is worthy of first prize, the association rosette must be awarded to that entry.

State Contest: The state contest will be held at The Association of Connecticut Fairs Fall Meeting (check www.ctagfairs.org for date and location). Each fair must contact the winner of their local contest and provide information about reservations and other contest info. The Association of Connecticut Fairs does not contact the contestants.

The following prizes will be awarded in each category

1st Place—\$50 2nd Place—\$35 3rd Place—\$15

- 1 Hand-Applique
- 2 Patchwork. No tied quilts. No precut quilt kits

Contest Rules:

- 1. All work must be completed by an individual quilt maker.
- 2. Work can be pieced by hand or by machine but applique must be done by hand.
- 3. Quilts may be hand or machine quilted
- 4. To qualify for an applique quilt, the quilt must be at least 50% applique.
- 5. All 4 sides, when added together, must measure a minimum of 216 inches total.
- 6. No wall hanging.

Department Rules

The Youth Department includes the Children's Division and the Junior Division.

Children's Division: Exhibitors must be at least 5 years of age as of Sept. 1, but not yet 14 years of age as of Oct. 1. They may enter in classes Y1-Y124. The children must have had a major part in the planning and preparation of their entry. Any project that has had adult supervision should include a brief statement on a 3 x 5" card stating what help was given and what part the child did.

Junior Division: Exhibitors must be at least 14 years of age, but not yet 18 years of age as of Oct. 1. They may enter in classes J130-J208.

Special Needs: We welcome exhibits by special needs youth. They are eligible for all classes. If appropriate, the child's exhibit can be displayed in a multiclass unit, using the Danish judging system but with no age consideration. All exhibit tickets will be uniform throughout the Department (no notation of special needs). Parent, teacher or adviser, please write special needs on the entry and we can discuss display.

General Rules

- See page 1 for the schedule of entry form deadlines and delivery of items. Fairground directions are on the Fair website.
- To enter online, go to www.durhamfair.com. WE WILL ONLY BE ACCEPTING ONLINE ENTRIES UNLESS A VALID REASON FOR PAPER IS SUPPLIED. Please remember to enter crafts, veggies, etc. under YOUTH and not under the adult sections. Also, enter using child's name (NOT ADULT) and date of birth & age.
- 3. Only 1 entry per exhibitor per class will be accepted and only those classes listed will be judged. However, the Superintendent reserves the right to expand or delete classes if the need arises.

- 4. Exhibits that have previously won a prize at the Durham Fair are not eligible for judging.
- Judging for the Department, with the exception of J192 Lego Robot Creation, will be on the Danish System (all exhibits judged on their own merits and not in competition with other entries).
- 5. All exhibits must remain in place until 7 p.m. on Sun. to be eligible for awards. Exhibits may be removed on Sun. between 7 and 8 p.m. or on Mon. between 5 and 7 p.m. Any exhibits not removed by 7 p.m. Mon. will become property of the Fair.

Practical Suggestions

Watch your proportions. See that your flowers are approximately one and a half times the height of the vase, or one and a half times the width of the bowl. Keep in mind that the vase and flowers should have a nice relationship. Mass the heavy or dark flowers near the base of the arrangement.

Keep light colors and forms at the top for balance.

Try to make stems seemingly start from a central point. Where stems appear to meet, put an accent, a flower or a leaf.

Avoid confusion in your arrangement. Better too few flowers than too many.

Fasten flat holders to a bowl with modeling clay before you add water. This gives stability to the holder.

Oasis makes a very useful holder.

Maple-Raisin Oatmeal Bars

Ingredients

1 cup King Arthur Flour unbleached all purpose flour

1 cup quick-cooking oats

1/2 cup packed brown sugar

1/4 teaspoon salt

1/4 teaspoon baking soda

1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon

6 tablespoons butter, melted

3 tablespoons orange juice

Filling:

1¹/₃ cups raisins

3/4 cup sour cream

2 tablespoons maple syrup

2 tablespoons brown sugar

2 tablespoons King Arthur Flour unbleached all-purpose flour

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

1/2 teaspoon grated orange rind

1 large egg white, beaten

- 1. Preheat oven to 325°
- 2. To prepare crust combine flour, oats, brown sugar, salt, baking soda and cinnamon in a medium bowl stirring well with a whisk. Drizzle butter and orange juice over flour mixture, stirring until moistened. Mixture will be crumbly. Set aside 1/2 cup of this oat mixture. Spray 11 x 7" baking dish with cooking spray. Press remaining oat mixture into the bottom of the baking dish.
